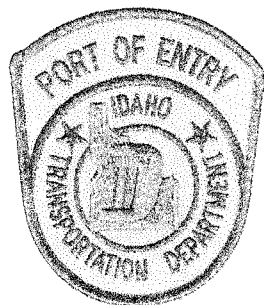

DO I NEED TO STOP AT AN IDAHO PORT OF ENTRY?

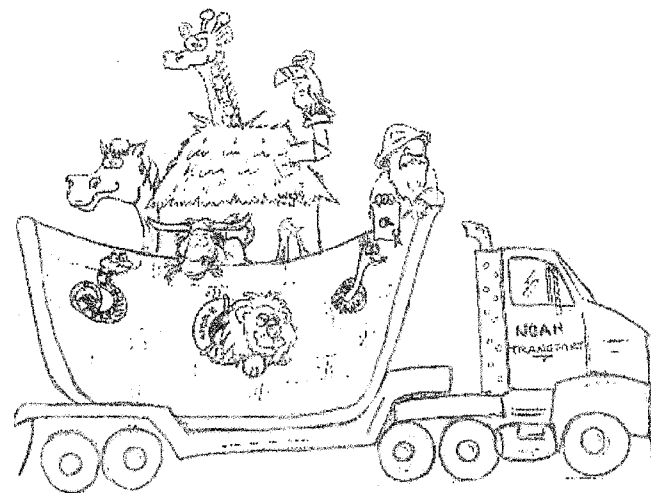


You sure do!

- All vehicles over 10,000 pounds carrying livestock must stop at ports of entry. This requirement applies to everyone—not just commercial haulers.
- All vehicles entering Idaho with livestock must stop at a port of entry or a roving check station. This applies to everyone, regardless of vehicle weight.



WHAT ANIMALS ARE CONSIDERED "LIVESTOCK?"



Idaho defines livestock as:

- Equine (horses, asses, and mules)
- Cattle
- Bison
- Swine
- Sheep and Goats
- Domestic Cervidae (deer and elk)
- Camelidae (llamas, alpacas, camels, etc.)
- Ratites (ostrich, emu, and rhea)
- Gallinaceous Birds (chickens, turkeys, etc.)
- Captive Wildfowl

WHAT PAPERWORK DO I NEED?

All livestock entering the state must be accompanied in transit by:

- an official health certificate (except livestock destined for an approved livestock market)
- documentation of ownership (another state's brand inspection, purebred registration, or health papers).

All equine and cattle leaving the state must be accompanied by:

- a brand inspection
- a health certificate (additionally, horses are required have a negative Coggins test)
